Scripture Reading: John 20:19-31

Smooth seas do not make skillful sailors. —African proverb

In the Bible we read that “every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low: and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain” (Isaiah 40:4). “The crooked shall be made straight.” This might be a reference to “rough places” or a crooked highway. Someday, the word of the Lord declares, what is crooked will be made straight.

We might all agree that this is a good thing. But what if there are times when it’s better to be crooked than straight? Is it possible?

Maybe.

In England, it is not uncommon to find crooked or curved walls in gardens and lawn areas rather than a straight wall. Known as *crinkle crinkle* walls, or serpentine walls, they require fewer bricks than the straight ones! How is that possible?

A straight wall made on a single column of bricks topples over rather easily. That’s why a straight wall requires at least a double column of bricks. A curved, angled or crooked wall, on the other hand, requires only a single row of bricks. The crooked or curved construction makes the wall impervious to the forces that would topple a conventional straight wall.

What’s the point? We’re crooked people. No, not morally crooked, but crooked in the sense that we’ve been bent by the forces of experience, the winds of adversity and the storms of change. Yet, the outcome is that these forces have made us strong! We are strong in the crooked places; we are steadfast when all around us is falling; we are whole when so many others are incomplete.

The apostle Paul said that because of his trials and tribulation, “So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong” (2 Corinthians 12:9-10).

A curved and crooked wall might seem to be a weak one. But now, you and I know that it is a strong wall.

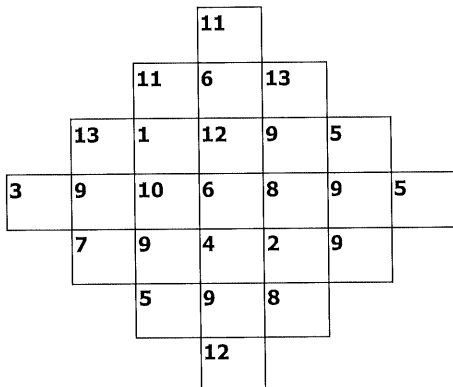
