Rainbows are a special treat. Oceans and mountains will always be there. Sunsets and sunrises emerge slowly and you have time to have your camera ready.

We love rainbows for another reason: they only appear after a rainstorm. Only after the sky has been dark, and only after rain will you see a rainbow.

And occasionally, there's a double blessing: two rainbows, one above the other!

The rainbow is the topic in today's Bible reading from Genesis 9. A great flood has covered the earth. Only the righteous souls on the earth at the time had been spared: Noah and his family and pairs of every living thing.

This story has spawned many puns and funny ideas. Here are a few you can repeat to your grandchildren or friends:

What kind of lighting did Noah have on the ark? Flood lights.

Where did Noah keep his bees? In the ark hives.

What was the name of Noah's wife? *Joan of Ark*.

On with the story. So now, the waters have receded and God has a chat with Noah. Do you know what God said?

God said to Noah and his sons that he would make a promise to them: Never again would a flood cover the earth as it had so recently. God said that he would place a "bow" in the clouds, and every time he saw the bow, God would remember his promise.
